## Creation Small Group Questions



The following questions are intended to start conversations. Use only the ones your group finds helpful. Explore others as they come up.

Our preaching series this fall will explore Genesis 1-11 (Origins). Questions will be provided each week to help you think about these stories BEFORE you listen to the sermon. It is our hope that this will encourage your own study and prepare you for the upcoming sermon.

- Read **Genesis 1:1-2:4** together as a group. What stands out for you? Try not to rush this question—take the time to notice as many things as you can.
- Genesis provides no details on the origin of God; the text assumes that God has always existed. What do you think God was doing before creation?
- What is the genre (type of literature) of the creation story? Why do you think this? Why does this matter?
- What is significant about God's word speaking creation into being? Read **John 1:1-5**. How does John pick up (and develop) this theme?
- What are the connections between Days 1-3 and Days 4-6?
- How many times does God see that creation is good? What is significant about this? Do you think that God still views creation this way?
- Does it make any difference whether we refer to the world as "creation", "nature", or "the environment"? Are there assumptions (or ideologies) embedded in these words?
- What is the first thing in creation that is referred to as holy? What might be going on here?
- Assuming that this text is <u>not</u> a scientific explanation of how the world came into being, what is the purpose of the creation narrative? In other words, what does the author want us to notice and learn?

## In the coming week you are invited to reread Genesis 1:1-2:4.

- -What stood out to you in this story?
- -Was there anything confusing or troubling?
- -Did anything make you think differently about God?
- -How might this change the way we live?
